

The Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) is part of a new, government-led programme to help restore and enhance nature across England. It's a strategy designed for both nature and people, aiming to improve our environment while supporting health, wellbeing, the economy, and climate resilience.

Shropshire Council and Telford & Wrekin Council are working together to create a strategy that sets out how nature recover could work locally.

This strategy includes the creation of an interactive map that highlights:

- Areas already rich in wildlife.
- Opportunities for habitat improvement and connectivity in the future.
- Potential actions to support water, soil and biodiversity.

The LNRS aims to:

- Guide future funding and investment in nature recovery.
- Help connect habitats to benefit wildlife and landscapes without harming productivity.
- Identify priority areas that could benefit from a 15% uplift in Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) value, as well as access to future green finance opportunities.

By sharing your knowledge now, you can shape how land is represented and where the opportunities lie, to maximise the strategy's long-term impact.

The consultation invites you to:

- 1. Read the draft strategy document.
- 2. Check the interactive map to see what opportunities have been mapped on land you know or own.
- 3. Tell us if our plans are realistic or what could be improved. You can do this by commenting on the map or completing the survey. Your feedback is confidential and won't be visible to the public.
- **4. Share any work you're already doing** for nature, so it can be included.
- 5. Submit your feedback before 15 October 2025.
