Travel to Work

In Oswestry 17.3% of those employed work from home, this is higher than the national and regional figures. The largest group of people travel less than 2km to work in Oswestry, compared to nationally and regionally where the highest percentage of people travel 2-5km to work. Table 3.

VAT Stocks 2006

At the end of the year 2006 there were 1,555 businesses registered for VAT in Oswestry; this figure represents 12% of the total in Shropshire. Nationally 1.8 million of the estimated 4.3 million enterprises in the UK were VAT-registered in 2005.

The industrial structure of VAT registered businesses is illustrated in Table 4.

- The highest concentration in Oswestry is found in Agriculture and fishing 20.2%, much higher than in the West Midlands and England.
- The next highest is in Wholesale and retail, followed by Real estate.

VAT Registrations and Deregistrations 2006

During 2006 there were 130 VAT Registrations and 80 Deregistrations in Oswestry. This is not a true representation of business start-ups and closures because a businesses may have crossed the VAT threshold or fallen below it. However, an estimated rate of new business start-ups or closures can be calculated by showing new business registrations or deregistrations during 2006 against the total number of registered businesses at the end of 2005. This figure will only cover businesses

which register for VAT, so very small businesses and those exempt will not be included.

 During 2006, Oswestry had a higher rate of business start-up and a lower closure rate than the West Midlands and England. Table 5.

Net Change 1980 to 2006¹

Table 6 shows the net change in VAT registered businesses in Oswestry since 1980¹; as with the County; the down turn in the mid 80's, boom years of the early and late 1980's and recession of the early 1990's can be seen. The net changes in the 1990's were more erratic, a trend continuing into the 2000's.

- In Oswestry the actual number of business registered for VAT peaked in 2006 at 1,550
- The new business start-up rate was highest in 1990 when it reached 12.2%; this was a lower peak rate than country, regional and national rates which occurred in 1989. Recently the rate has stabilised at 8.0% lower than the regional and national rates.
- The business closure rate peaked in 1993; when the rate in Oswestry was 12.1%, considerably higher than the County peak in 1992 but lower than the regional and national peaks. Closure rates in Oswestry have varied between 6% and 6.8% over a five year period.

Labour Market in Oswestry

Annual Population Survey

- Oswestry has a similar economic activity rate of 77.8 to Shropshire and England as a whole. Table 9. In 2005, there were 22,600 residents of working age living in Oswestry, of these 17,600 were economically active.
- Men of working age in Oswestry have an economic rate 10% higher than females. This gap is similar to regional and national figures.

- In Oswestry people aged between 20 and 24 years have the highest economic activity rates at 88.9%, higher than the figures regionally and nationally. Table 10.
- Oswestry has an economic rate of 62.6% for those over 50, this is considerably lower than the national and regional average.

Technical note - Annual Population Survey.

- The Annual Population Survey has replaced the LFS and provides information on the labour market.
- The APS has a larger sample of 65,000 households, 500,000 people a year to achieve a minimum sample of 500 economically active adults in each local authority district in England.
- The APS provides information about individual's circumstances on a range of subjects including housing, employment and education.
- The Economic Activity Rate provides a measure of the proportion of the population who are active, or potentially active members of the labour market, a low activity rate would indicate a high proportion of people who are unavailable for work or training.
- Economic activity rates are the number of people of working age who are in employment or unemployed expressed as a percentage of the working age population.

Employment Structure 2006



Size of Workplaces 2006

The Annual Business Inquiry provides information on the size and number of workplaces in Shropshire.

In 2006, the Annual Business Inquiry recorded 1,612 workplaces in Oswestry, which employed 15,400 people. The majority of these workplaces fall into the small firms sector; 94.0% (1,516) had less than 25 employees and 89.3% had 10 or fewer employees, Table 16.

The average size of a workplace in Oswestry is 10 people, compared to 11.8 in the West Midlands and 11 in England.

Technical note - Annual Business Inquiry

- The Annual Business Inquiry is a sample survey of employers carried out by the Office for National Statistics, which gives employment information based on where people work. The figures, which are grossed up to give full results, are referred to as employee jobs.
- The survey records employee jobs located in Shropshire by type and industry but it excludes the self-employed and HM Forces.
- Figures for people employed in agriculture are provided by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (MAFF).
- The figures have been rounded to 100 for confidentiality; therefore, figures may not sum due to rounding.
- The Annual Business Inquiry is a sample survey of businesses, and because of this there are some issues which mean care needs to be taken when viewing the data. Due to it being a sample survey there are some sampling errors which may occur, particularly with the grossing methodologies used to model the data. Approximately 78,000 businesses are surveyed. The sample is drawn following a stratified random design with employment size band (1-9, 10-19, 20-45, 50-99, 100-249 and 250+) region and industry as its dimensions. All businesses over 250 are sampled every year and the remaining size bands are surveyed with a rotation of 50% every year.
- Validation carried out on the data for Shropshire has led to some queries about some of the figures produced by the ABI. In particular the consistency of business inclusion at ward level does not seem consistent with know information about the county. There have also been significant changes at ward and district levels in certain industries which do not correspond with know information about the development and business patterns. Some of these issues may be due to the ABI being derived from a sample and modelled on the economy as a country rather than taking in to account individual changes in a county, particularly Shropshire which due to its rural quality does not follow patterns of economy and development as a more urban area does. Errors may also occur if employers do not return forms, fill them incorrectly or inconsistently, or for other reasons, are completely left out of the sample. Business headquarters has also led to inconsistencies in data in how they are recorded.
- The Annual Business Inquiry data from Nomis has been combined into nine broad industrial groups, which been defined by amalgamating the Standard Industrial Classification (2003) Divisions. These are similar to the 1992 SIC, the main change is that the head offices are now classified to division 74 where as they used to be classified to the main activity of the business. The Divisions in each group are: Agriculture and fishing 01-05; Energy and water 10-14 & 40-41; Manufacturing 15-37; Construction 45; Distribution, hotels and restaurants 50-55; Transport and communications 60-64; Banking, finance and insurance, etc 65-74; Public administration, education & health 75-85; Other services 90-99.
- The district figures for Energy & Water have been combined with Manufacturing for confidentiality.

UNEMPLOYMENT

- Unemployment in Oswestry is low when compared with the figures for the West Midlands and England.
- In December 2007 the claimant count unemployment rate in Oswestry was 1.8% compared to 2.9% in the West Midlands and 2.1% in England. Similarly, male and female unemployment rates in Oswestry are lower than the regional and national averages.
- In December 2007 there were 415 people claiming unemployment benefits in Oswestry, of which 300 were men and 115 women.

- Female unemployment has decreased by 3 or 2.5%, this is a lower rate than regionally and nationally.






Figure 3. Youth Unemployment in Oswestry, 2002 - 2007

The change in unemployment rates in Oswestry over a longer period December 2001 to December 2007 is illustrated in Figure 3. Generally, unemployment rises in January, falls between March and June, rises again in July and August and then falls in the months up to December. Youth Unemployment




Figure 4. Long Term Unemployment in Oswestry, 2002 – 2007.

Figure 4 shows the trend of youth unemployment over the last 5 years. Since 2002 the proportion unemployed in Oswestry fluctuated at around 27%, in 2005 the rates were higher than Shropshire and the same as national rates.

Long Term Unemployment

In December 2007 there were 110 people classified as long term unemployed in Oswestry (on the claimant register for 6 months or more), 27.0% compared to 36.1% in the West Midlands and 30.7% in England, figure 5.

 In Oswestry the number of long term unemployed has stayed the same since December 2006, the proportion has increased by 2.5%. In the West Midlands the proportion has fallen by 3.9% and in England the proportion has fallen by 4.1%.

Over the past 5 years long term unemployment in Oswestry has been dropping at a similar rate to Shropshire and nationally.

Vacancies notified to Jobcentres

Information about job vacancies is supplied to Jobcentre Plus by the Department for Work and Pensions. The data should be interpreted carefully to take into account changes made in recent years to procedures for taking and handling vacancies. The Jobcentre Plus vacancies series does not cover all the vacancies in the economy. The proportion of vacancies which are notified by employers varies over time, according to the occupation and industry of the vacancies and also by geographical

area. The figures are best used to give an indication of the types of jobs currently available, rather than absolute changes over time.

In Oswestry for December 2007, banking, finance and insurance, had the highest number of notified vacancies, 64, followed by distribution, hotels and restaurants 35. Together these make up 61.1% of the total notified vacancies for Oswestry. Table 23.


It should be noted that it is permitted development for Use Class Order B1 to change to B8, B8 to change to B1 and for B2 to change to either B1 or B8 where the gross floor space is less than 235 sqm. Due to this we are unable to monitor some of the smaller developments that take place across Shropshire.

Figure 5 Class B employment land completions 2006/2007





Of the outstanding 9.820 hectares of employment land with planning permission only 0.246 hectares was under construction at April 2007. Of the remaining 9.574 hectares 59% has full planning permission and 41% has outline permission.

Class B2 accounts for 82% of the total outstanding amount, the largest site being a 12 hectare Greenfield site at Weston Farm, Oswestry.

Other large sites include 3.93 hectares at Rod Meadows Industrial Estate, Shrewsbury Road, Oswestry for a speculative mixed use development of B1 (business), C1/A3 (hotel and restaurant) and D1 (day nursery), 2.139 hectares for B2 use on land adjacent Maesbury Road/A483/Weston Lane, Oswestry for industrial development and 2.334 hectares at Lees Farm, Rednal where planning has been granted for the conversion of agricultural/former RAF buildings to industrial units (B2 use).
