

Grizzled Skipper (Pyrgus malvae)



1 Objectives and Targets

1.1 Objectives

- A. Protect, enhance and monitor the existing populations present on sites in two core areas (Oswestry Uplands and the Wyre Forest).
- B. Encourage more appropriate management on at least two more sites in each of these core areas.
- C. Increase survey effort directed at this species to see if it is present on other Shropshire sites.
- D. Increase awareness of the status and needs of Grizzled Skipper in Shropshire through communication and education.

1.2 Targets

 Maintain all existing Grizzled Skipper colonies within the two core areas and aim to bring at least four more sites into suitable management by 2010.

2 Current Status

2.1 Importance

The Grizzled Skipper still occurs widely in Europe although it has recently declined in several European countries. It was formerly widely distributed in England and parts of Wales but declined substantially during the twentieth century especially in the western and northern parts of its range.

2.2 Trends

The decline of the Grizzled Skipper is estimated to be >50% in the UK over the last 25 years (hence its inclusion as a UK BAP Priority Species Candidate).

2.3 Population and Distribution

The main strongholds for the Grizzled Skipper are now the southern English counties e.g. Dorset, Somerset, Hampshire and Wiltshire. In Shropshire it is now a very localised butterfly which is largely restricted to two main areas (the Wyre Forest and the Oswestry Uplands) with an occasional colony elsewhere.

3 Current Factors Affecting the Species

- Continuing changes in woodland management.
- Continuing decline in the market for coppice products.
- Natural succession causing deterioration in grassland/scrub and disused artificial habitats.
- Continuing fragmentation and isolation of habitats.

4 Current Action

4.1 Policy and Protection

- The Grizzled Skipper is not currently listed on Schedule 5 of the 1981 Wildlife and Countryside Act and therefore has no statutory protection.
- It is however now listed under the following category:
 - UKBAP Priority Species Candidate (2005)
 - A species action plan for the Grizzled Skipper was prepared in 1998 by Butterfly Conservation.
- A good number of the known sites for Grizzled Skipper in Shropshire are SSSI's.
- Sites in the Oswestry and Wyre Forest areas fall within Biodiversity Enhancement Areas.

4.2 Management, Research and Survey

- Four sites in the Oswestry Uplands are managed sympathetically by the Shropshire Wildlife Trust with recent management work on one other key site in this area (Llynclys Quarry) very likely to benefit this species.
- Management of the Wyre Forest pipeline as an open area has retained Grizzled Skipper in this key part of the Wyre Forest until now. Management of the IMI Wyre Forest site has suited this species in the past.

5. Key Habitats

- Scrubby unimproved grassland especially chalk downland and limestone grasslands.
- Woodland clearings
- Disused artificial habitats such as quarries, pits and railway lines.
